## FINAL STATUS OF BCHA-FOREST SERVICE TRAILS CLASSIFICATION LAWSUIT

As many of you are aware, Back Country Horsemen of America recently filed a lawsuit challenging the Forest Service's development of a new trail classification system (TCS) which will be implemented in a way that we believe will reduce our access to trails on the National Forests. BCHA's concern was that the new trail classification system would make it extremely easy for Forest Service personnel in the field to downgrade trails, with no public input much less notice, and thus end up keeping stock off these trails. Despite exhaustive efforts to work with the Forest Service amicably to resolve our issues, the agency simply refused to insert safeguards into the new system and assured us that our predictions of reduced stock use were unjustified. We then reluctantly concluded that our only option to protect our interests was to bring the matter before a judge by filing a lawsuit. Our fundamental argument to the judge was that developing a new trail classification system was something that the public had a right to be involved in, and it should not be left solely to a handful of selected agency personnel who may not have our interests in mind.

In response to our suit, the Forest Service aggressively argued that the TCS was an internal agency matter that did not affect us. The agency misleadingly portrayed the TCS as merely taking "inventory" and that it involved administrative decisions on how best to apply the limited agency budget. In other words, it was none of our business. The problem was that the TCS would *also* serve as the active management guide for how trails would be maintained. Moreover, the TCS created a new trail class that was exclusively for hikers, and would allow field personnel to easily slip trails into this class, especially trails in wilderness areas, with no public involvement.

The judge agreed with us that we have a right under federal law to be involved in decisions such as the one at issue, which involve the trail system. This holding is a critical development in establishing our rights with respect to our trails. Being informed of and having a right to have input in an agency decision is critical to protecting our rights, and before this holding the Forest Service was able to operate behind a curtain. Given her holding, the judge ordered the Forest Service to comply with the law and involve the public in its decision-making process, *before* it made a decision. The Forest Service has indicated to us that, in response to the judge's order, they intend to issue a notice of their intended action and provide for full public comment on the new trail classification system and its impacts.

The key now is to ensure that our concerns are heard and addressed. We have engaged lawyers to successfully enforce our rights to be involved (which the Forest Service wanted to deny us), and now it is our turn to make the most of our rights. To do this, it is very important that, through our formal comments, and any other communications that we can make, the Forest Service officials who repeatedly tell us that they support stock use truly understand our concerns. We will use this opportunity to fight for safeguards in the process that protect against secret agency action and unjustified limits being imposed on our use of our trails.

In addition, we as individuals must continually ensure that any re-classification of specific trails is done through a *public process*. The first step you can take is to find out the classes which are currently assigned to the trails in your area and inform your local District Rangers and Recreational Managers that you want to be told of any changes in those classifications. To ensure that you are kept informed, periodically ask for the current trail classes so that the agency knows you are staying on top of the issue. In the event a trail in your area is downgraded, you must actively lobby your Forest and local Congressman or Senator and fight that decision.

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## Wild Women’s Extreme Pack Trip

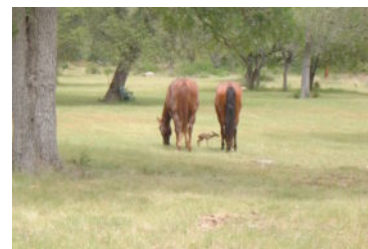

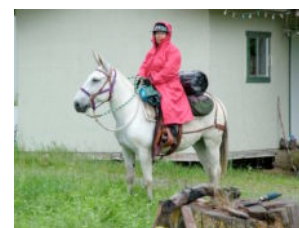

## GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING 6/15/2006

Meeting called to order 7:00 pm

Karen motion to dismiss secretary's minutes. Debbie Nelson seconded – discussed – passed.

- Trail Boss – Vicki Gish – There was a meeting at Pizza Factory of a newly organized user group, Northeast Washington Forestry Coalition (NEWFC) This group will be able to negotiate with Forest Service regarding user groups issues on trails, consider roads-to-trail conversions, attempt to find solutions to recreation related disputes and challenges. Jory Morgan Clinic this weekend. June 24<sup>th</sup> Republic Poker Ride. July 1<sup>st</sup> Kettle Crest ride – may be too much snow still on ground.
- Ride the West – Jim Hudkins – Susan Rae thanked us for helping on the Trail Course and asked how we like the Judges, Cathy & Doug. If anyone has feed back concerning Ride the West please contact Jim.
- Director Bob Gish – Jeff Chapman has a proposal for a General 3 Zone Plan for Olympic National Park for a Wilderness Trails: 1) a Wilderness Trail Zone for riding & packing stock, 2) a primitive trail zone – no stock, 3) and a Primeval zone, no stock. Stock use could be restricted even in Wilderness Trail Zone. Stock users have until August 15 to write letters, send emails, faxes and make calls regarding this proposal. Some trails that are not used/or kept up will be allowed to be rehabilitated. We need to continue to monitor and be very vocal regarding trails in wilderness etc. Right to Ride is still being argued, email then follow up with a phone call or letter to Senators Patty Murray and Maria Cantwell.
- Lu Lemeiux gave a better cost share for us. This summer after June 30, there needs to be 4 miles of trail done: 80' of puncheon, split on site, trail logged out. Trail 261 out of Shoo Tree – Stagger Inn. Forest Service will be there to help. We will get 2500.00
- Dave Jackson won the camper.
- BCHA has not taken a stand on NAIS.
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Vicki Gish made a motion for an ad in the Deer Park Fair Book and sponsor a class for 65.00. Debbie Nelson seconded. Discussion. Approved.

Motion to adjourn Jim Nelson, Seconded Debbie Nelson. Approved.

## **Report on the Jory Morgan Clinic** **By Vicki Gish**

We had the Clinic on June 17<sup>th</sup> at Cody Francis's Newport Arena. We had 10 horses and mules with 10 students. The weather was good. Bruce Foreman, Judy Clark, Debbie Nelson, Dana Ogle, Talea Morgan, Cyndi Johnson, Bob Gish, Gene Hennige, Jory, and myself were ready to work. Steve and Cathy Smith came up to observe. Cody's arena was perfect.

Jory showed us some techniques to work with our animals moving away from pressure and keeping them out of our space. He showed us about sacking out colts, hobbling, working their feet with a soft rope so the horses would get used to ropes hitting their feet and not to panic. We worked with soft ropes under tails to teach them not to clamp their tails on a lead rope and get tail burns. We rode with a flag and picked up barrels while riding. We were shown how to use a barrel for side passing around and backing up using leg pressure.

Jory did his famous head stand on the back of a horse. Then we were off to Pee Wee Creek Trailhead to set up camp for the night.

We had another great pot luck dinner and visited after dinner. We got to know Gene better and he promised we would see him at some work parties. Jory entertained us with his stories, singing and guitar playing the rest of the evening.

The next morning, we were riding the trails by 10 am. Talea lead the group after lunch and Jory was behind her...roping her horse's hind legs as we went down the trail. No one else was interested in riding in front of Jory after that. We all had a good time and a safe ride. Oh, I forgot. Ayla, Bob's mule spooked at a killer squirrel and did a 180 turn. What saved Bob's bacon was Jory had told him to keep a tighter rein on her while riding so he would have more control of her...he stayed on.

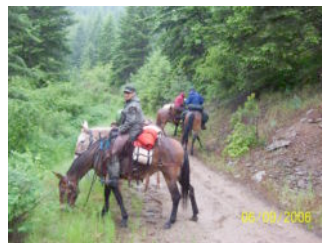
Hi all,
